I threw this together as I've had loads of people asking for recommendations, particularly for very young children.




Muhammad Ali - Little People, Big Dreams by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara

What If... by Samantha Berger




Creativity, the power of imagination, and the importance of self-expression are celebrated in this inspiring picture book written and illustrated by real-life best friends.

If All The World Were... by Joseph Coelho and Allison Colpoys




A moving, lyrical picture book about a young girl's love for her granddad and how she copes when he's gone, written by poet and playwright Joseph Coelho.

My Hair by Hannah Lee




My birthday's coming up so soon, I'll need new clothes to wear. But most of all, I need to know, How shall I style my hair?

Young, Gifted and Black by Jamia Wilson



Hidden Figures by Margot Lee Shetterly




Ruby's Worry *by Tom Percival*






Martin Luther King Jr - Little People, Big Dreams by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara


Rosa Parks - Little People, Big Dreams by Lisbeth Kaiser



In this book from the highly acclaimed Little People, BIG DREAMS series, discover the incredible life of Rosa Parks, the 'Mother of the Freedom Movement.'




Harriet Tubman - Little People, Big Dreams by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara




My Brown Skin by Thomishia Brooker


Handa's Surprise by Eileen Browne

It's up to Daddy to give his daughter an extra-special hair style in this story of self-confidence and the love between fathers and daughters.


Zuri knows her hair is beautiful, but it has a mind of its own!

But he LOVES his Zuri, and he'll do anything to make her - and her hair - happy.






Sulwe's skin is the colour of midnight. She's darker than everyone in her family, and everyone at school.



Gregory Cool by Caroline Binch





Counting on Kathrine *by Helaine Becker*




Malcolm Little by Ilyasah Shabazz


Let The Children March by Monica Clark-Robinson

Last Stop On Market Street by Matt De La Peña




Sometimes when you're surrounded by dirt, CJ, you're a better witness for what's beautiful."


This beautifully illustrated, emotive picture book explores urban life with honesty, interest and gratitude.

Ella Fitzgerald - Little People, Big Dreams by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara


