Dear Parents.

Please allow me some personal thoughts to start today's newsletter.

I am writing this to you on Friday morning before I leave school early to watch my oldest boy receive his degree in Technical Theatre Studies from St. Mary's University in Twickenham. He is getting a First Class Honours degree but that is not why I mention it. He is obviously very special to me - as are your beautiful children to you - but my son struggled at times through school (he is dyslexic) and his school often struggled to support him to achieve his best. I say this without criticising them. For me the learning from his experience was two-fold: firstly, that the school, the learner and his family kept working together to unlock his potential and secondly, he didn't give up! We have talked all year about using our Core Christian Values (CCV) - particularly in this case, perseverance - to help us push through any barriers that are put in front of us. This I think is the model for St. Luke's to be the best it can: a strong home-school partnership that allows all our children to thrive. I am aware that we, as a school, do not always get it right but I assure you that by working together we can all succeed.

SIAMS

I was phoned last Wednesday and informed that St. Luke's would be having our SIAMS – Statutory Inspection of Anglican & Methodist Schools - this coming Wednesday, 3rd of April. The lead inspector, Ms Corbyn, will be onsite between 8am and 5pm and during that time will be gathering a range of evidence and will be especially keen to gather the opinions of children and parents about how the school meets our school vision and important duty as a distinctively Christian School.
