Kwame, who finished at St. Luke's in 2016, died from a brain tumour and needless to say Mum, Dad, his brother (Y2) and older brother are all devastated by this tragedy. Can we all remember Kwame and his family in our prayers and help his family feel the love and warmth for them coming from our community.

Those staff that knew Kwame were also devastated by the news. The sentiments of Mrs Tarbuck and Mrs Aulakh below probably best sum up the abiding memories we all have of him.

"The first thing I think of is Kwame's big smile and his sense of fun. He brought so much joy and laughter to year 6 and he was so very kind. Not just to his friends but to those in other year groups too. He would always encourage others to join in a game if they looked lonely at break time and could always get them smiling faster than anyone else could.

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You are always loved

and never forgotten.

He was so kind-hearted, but not in a timid way. No way! There was nothing shy about Kwame! As soon as you saw

that smile you knew mischief was brewing! He was ever so playful and energetic, both outside and in the classroom. And he was so bright! Such curiosity! Always asking questions and wanting to know more. He will be so very missed.

You'll always be in our hearts but never forgotten!" Love Mrs Tarbuck.


One thing that is not changing is that school finishes for the Summer holiday as planned at: 1pm on Friday the 17th July.

Mathletics is the online support for maths using games to reinforce learning. The school as a whole has spent over 1551 hours16 minutes online on Mathletics this year scoring an impressive 1,096,170 points. This works out at an average of 7 hours and 50 minutes per pupil whilst completing over 10,511 activities working out at 53 per child!


Some children have many more such as Natalie in Y2 who spent an incredible 84 hours on Mathletics and Nana, Y2, who completed 138 activities throughout the year!

And talking of Year 2, they were also the class who spent the most time online with an incredible 458 hours 33 minutes, scoring a truly amazing 361,161 points - well clear of their closest rivals Year 4 who scored a still respectable 231,681 points!
