Remote Learning

This week our monitoring shows that we had the following averages of children engaging with the remote work over the 5 days:

Y6 = 93%, Y5 = 92%, Y4 = 80%, Y3 = 83%, Y2 = 82%, Y1 = 70%

These figures are testament to the importance you as families place on education – big hugs for you all and all the support that you give the children when you can fit it in around work.

Struggling to find the right book to read?

The local libraries are extending their Winter Reading Challenge. Children can pick up a bag of Ready Reads from their local library. This will be a bag of books pre-selected for children to read and grouped by either age, genre or interest. Children can also access children's library books using the the e-catalogue www.newham.gov.uk/libraries and can access these collections using their library card number and PIN, or can create a temporary membership online for this purpose. However children will not need necessarily have to complete their entries using this form. They can use whatever they like (Word doc, postcard, etc) and either scan their entry to us at library.activities@newham.gov.uk or hand it in to any Newham library.

Free School Meals - message from LBN

Why apply when children in primary schools already receive a free hot lunch in school? Although all children in reception, Y1 and Y2 receive a free lunch at school under the Government's Universal infant free school meals (UIFSM) scheme and those in years 3 to 6 receive a meal under the *Eat for Free* programme, we want to encourage all families to apply for free school meals to determine their eligibility for additional benefits.

The benefits Children from families who are in receipt of one of the qualifying benefits are currently entitled to much more than a free lunch at school, such as:

- · Food vouchers or parcels during the school holidays
- · Free places at council school holiday activities
- · Additional support at school to raise their attainment

In addition, for every child whose family applies and qualifies for FSM, their primary school will receive £1,345 in the budget and secondary schools receive £955.

How do I apply?

Applying is easy, simply visit the Newham website and complete a simple online form. All you need to apply is your name, national insurance number or ARC number and the names of your children.

Frequently asked questions:

I am working, why should I apply?

We encourage everyone to apply irrespective of their home or immigration status as we hold you details on file and check them every week to see if your entitlement may change. This ensures no child misses out on any of they may be entitled to.

I don't want the Council or my school knowing about my finances.

Eligibility is determined by the Department for Education's Eligibility Checking Services (ECS). This only informs council officers and schools if a child is or is not entitled to free school meals based on the information the applicant provided – they don't get told the reason why or anything about your financial position.

Parent Advice Phone-In with an Educational Psychologist (EP)

The EPS Parent Advice sessions are offered to any Newham parent or carer who would like to discuss concerns about their child with an educational psychologist (examples may include: your child's emotional well-being, challenging behaviours, learning progress, your relationship with your child or some of your own worries). The sessions aim to be supportive, confidential, and informal. Each session is 40 minutes.

Please note these are stand-alone, one-off sessions that do not result in follow-up work. They are free sessions and open to all parents and carers of Newham children and young people. There is no criteria or threshold to access these sessions.

Sessions will operate monthly on:



Who are Educational Psychologists? Educational psychologists are trained psychologists, registered with the Health and Care Professionals Council (HCPC) with enhanced DBS checks. We work with children and young people aged 0-25 years of age in partnership with young people, families, schools, practitioners, services and voluntary agencies. EPs offer focused support informed by sound psychological theory to bring about positive change. The aim is to promote and facilitate the educational, social and emotional development of children and young people.

What do Newham Educational Psychologists do? Newham's

Educational Psychology Service (EPS) offer psychological services including consultation, advice and training. Newham EPS input aims to support children and young people to help facilitate their development, including improving learning, understanding their own learning needs, identifying, managing and exploring their emotions, regulating their behaviours, developing their communication and interaction skills and forming and maintaining positive peer relationships. Working with adults who support young people is central to our model of working.
